




Real GDP Growth Has Been Stronger Than Expected






Doesn't Two Consecutive Declines in Real GDP Qualify As Recession?




Real Retail Sales Percent Change, Year-Over-Year





Service Prices Rising 5.2% From Year Ago in April


Consumer Price Index Percent Change, Year-Over-Year


Consumer Price Index Percent Change, Year-Over-Year



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
Federal Reserve is Not Expected to Lower Federal Funds Rate **Target Until Later This Year**








The Labor Shed is Much Larger With a Population of 1,279,688*




Unemployment Rate in GO Virginia Region 1 Localities Generally Above 2.4% State Average in March 2024




Employment Has Been Growing Since 2021 in GO Virginia Region 1 But Remains 2,423 Below Pre-Covid Level




Year-Over-Year Employment in Go Virginia Region 1 **Has Been Positive Since 2021**






Annual Average Wage Increase in Go Virginia Region 1 is Typically Less than in Virginia or U.S. (Data Through 2021Q1)

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

New Start Ups (Less Then 20 Employees) Have Added 5,320 Jobs in GO Virginia Region 1 Since 2018









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Regions Share Common Barriers to Increasing Housing Supply



Unavailable Resources

Limited availability of both land and construction workers increase costs

Regulations

Outdated zoning and permit codes slow down and restrict housing projects, making them more expensive

Lack of Infrastructure

Infrastructure and utilities are costly to expand (especially in rural regions) which increase housing costs

NIMBYism

Residents have strong opinions against building additional housing in their neighborhoods



 - Internal training/upskilling



As important as these grants are, they are only a fraction of the dollars held by these institutions. Collectively, VA foundations control nearly \$65 Billion.

However, most of these dollars are invested in traditional capital markets – think Wall Street. This means that communities all over the world benefit more from Virginia's wealth than our residents, workers, neighborhoods, and communities do.



Local Impact Investments are an additional tool (on top of grantmaking) for foundations to mobilize dollars for mission



Local impact investing brings investment dollars back home. It is defined as investing in local developments, companies, organizations, or funds to generate measurable community benefit and financial returns.

- In 2020, the City of Martinsville & Henry County completed a housing study that identified the workforce housing gap.
- A local manufactured housing developer, the City & County governments, United Way, USDA, and The Harvest Foundation agreed to partner to create a townhome neighborhood in the Uptown area targeted for revitalization (starting with 5 homes and expanding to 27 units).
- Harvest used investment capital to help fill financing gaps needed to begin construction.

There are powerful motivators driving foundations to add local investing to their impact toolkits!




Scale of Community Need: Our communities have needs and opportunities that surpass what is available annually in grants.



New Tool, New Solutions: Some community challenges like housing, food security, and growing local businesses are better suited for investing than grantmaking.



High Leverage \$: Billions of public and private dollars can move into communities, but not all communities are drawing in these resources. Often, local impact investing by foundations can help other sources of capital "fall into place" to make deals happen locally.


